GROUNDWORK LONDON Gender Pay Gap Report 2021



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Our visions is of a society of sustainable communities which are vibrant, healthy, and safe, which respect the local and global environment, and where individuals and enterprise prosper. We continue to evolve and grow as an organisation building on our experiences. successes, and learning. We are committed to fostering a culture of equity and inclusion, supporting participative and integrated working across all staff teams and seeking out a diversity of viewpoints both in the work that we do and the people that we employ.

We view promoting equality in the workplace as an ongoing endeavour; we aim to ensure our recruitment and remuneration processes continue to be aware and responsive to continuous improvement.

We are pleased to share our gender pay gap report at 5th April 2020. On this date Groundwork London employed 346 staff with 51% men and 49% women.

Average gender pay gap as a mean and median average

The mean hourly pay across the organisation for women was 3.84% higher than men's mean hourly rate. This is the difference between mens average hourly pay and women's average hourly pay by combining all salaries within the company.

The median hourly across the organisation for women was 0.4% higher than men's median hourly pay. This is the difference between the middle hourly pay for all men and the middle hourly pay for all women.

Average bonus gender pay gap as a median and mean average

29% of men and 13% of women received a bonus. Women's median annual bonus pay was 50.5% higher than men's. This is the difference between the middle bonus pay for all mean and the middle bonus pay for all women.

Women's mean annual bonus was 2.7% lower than men's. This is the difference between mens's average bonus pay and women's average bonus pay by combining all bonuses in the company.

Gender Split by Pay Group

There are more women than men in the top and lower middle quartiles, whilst there are more men than women in the upper middle and lower quartiles. This arises because there are more women in senior positions in the organisation than men and more men in the lower quartile as a result of the large number of staff employed in one specialist team that makes up over 23% of the total emloyees in the organisation of which a higher proportion are men.

Pay quartiles are calculated by splitting all employees in an organisation into four even groups according to their level of pay. Looking at the proportion of women in each quartile gives an indication of women's representation at different levels of the organisation.
