New youth space at Impact Training thanks to a £27k Whitemountain Programme grant

The Whitemountain Programme award has allowed Impact Training to knock two small, underused training rooms into one large space, where students and other young people can socialise and relax. It has been fitted out with two big smartboards, pool and table tennis tables and games.

Breedon Ireland's Whitemountain Programme provides funding for community amenity and biodiversity projects within 15 miles of Mullaghglass landfill site through the Landfill Communities Fund. To date over £8.5million has been allocated to almost 250 projects. These range from sports facilities to community halls, and from wildflower meadows to play areas.
