Public realm and urban design

We design and deliver schemes to develop, enhance and improve urban public spaces.

Recreation, sport and play facilities

Our work includes the preparation of projects ranging from conceptual masterplans through to contract delivery for local parks, play areas, skate parks, country parks and route ways.

Community spaces

We are involved with a wide range of projects including schools, churchyards, community gardens and pocket parks, where the primary aim is enhancing spaces and places for the benefit of local communities.

Blue and green infrastructure

Projects where waterways, drainage, sustainable urban drainage schemes and wetlands are an important or even central part of these schemes. Such projects can be great ways to enhance biodiversity whilst also creating sustainable access routes.

Public and private housing

We work with a number of social landlords to regenerate the external environment of their estates.

Climate resilience

We design interventions to deliver a range of benefits such as improving air quality around schools, natural flood management solutions, tree planting and sustainable urban drainage projects.



MORLEY TOWNS FUND

After the successful Towns Fund Bid to central government, Morley secured £24.3m to deliver projects to transform the town. Part of this funding has been earmarked for the greener and connected programme which includes:

- **⊘** The development of eight parks
- **⊘** The redesign and upgrade of a number of pocket parks
- **Setter facilities for pedestrians and cyclists**
- **⊘** Improved connections to the rail station
- ✓ Improving the civic space around the Grade I listed Morley Town Hall All projects will be completed by March 2026

Our Landscape Architects are leading on the delivery of the first three of these projects. Masterplans were developed for eight parks to help secure the funding and these are being further consulted upon, detailed and delivered in phases over the next four years.

The project so far, has been very well received by the client and residents and several consultation events have taken place to inform the proposals, both online and face to face. Final plans were produced in partnership with the Council and the Greener and Connected Sub Group for 2022/23 for the first two of these parks, Hembrigg and Dartmouth Parks, as well as proposals for Magpie Lane pocket park.







HEMBRIGG PARK

As part of the Morley Towns Deal, Hembrigg Park was the first park to start onsite. Hembrigg Park has had:

- Footpaths and the lower car park resurfaced
- New searing with wear pads throughout
- New woodland walk
- 4 39 trees planted including 22 fruit trees

- **▼** Tree planting with a mini orchard
- Bulb planting
- New wildflower meadow
- 34,942m² of park improved

All the planted trees were crown lifted and understorey planting thinned to allow views throughout the space. A new timber fence was also installed to replace the broken one which runs along the fall in level to the north of the site. The fitness station and renewed play area is still to be completed at the end of March 2023.

Feedback from residents has been positive and several public consultations took place to gauge thoughts on the proposals.

A community event also took place inviting people of all ages to come down to the park and draw their proposals for the mural on the side of the changing rooms. This will be included in the next phase of works along with the main entrance feature off Britannia Road.











DARTMOUTH PARK

As Dartmouth falls within a conservation area, it has been developed in phases to allow the necessary time for consultation and permissions for redevelopment.

One of the concerns at Dartmouth Park was the overgrown vegetation and lack of views through the formal pavilion gardens, making it feel secluded. To open the space, the overgrown understorey planting within the two central green spaces have been removed and more appropriate ornamental planting has been planted in its place.



The small planting beds within the spaces have also been combined into one large, easier to maintain bed. This ensures that all hiding places are removed and users can feel safer when walking through the gardens.

REIN PARK



The team worked at Rein Park in Seacroft, Leeds to improve the play area and create a pump track for the community.

The installed play area was complimented by a tree and bulb planting scheme to link the different areas. 14 Birch trees were planted and large swaths of daffodil and snowdrop bulbs, helping to improve 608m² of land.

We also worked alongside Leeds City Council and the LS14 Trust to develop and deliver the Rein Park Pump Track in Seacroft, Leeds. It was funded by Section 106 money and improved 1,300m² of land in the park. The all-weather tarmac course is complimented by a drainage system on this traditionally very wet site. The track has been a huge hit in the local community and complements other facilities in the park.







ASHTON ROAD PLAY AREA

Leeds City Council approached us to improve Ashton Road play area which was run down and badly in need of repair.

It has been given a new lease of life with a new multi-unit, swings, an activity trail and games markings, along with new play carpet surfacing.


The bland hard space has been softened with new tree planting and ornamental planting in a new raised planter, which doubles as seating. An Ivy green screen has been fixed to the perimeter fencing, adding to the urban oasis feel.











LEEDS LEVELLING UP FUND (LUF)

We worked with Leeds City Council as part of the Levelling up Fund (LUF) to improve parks across Leeds. The work was part of the Parks and Green Spaces Strategy 2022-2032, to improve parks and green spaces across the city, supporting the Council's Business Case submission to Central Government.

We worked to encourage community use, inclusion and improve health and well-being and worked to provide a host of benefits to the local communities such as; new trees, wildflower planting, new skate parks and multi-use games areas including improvements to play areas, sculpture trails, new artwork and new and improved community spaces.

The parks involved are:

- Western Flatts Cliff Park
- Stanningley Park
- **Armley Park**
- Bramley Fall Park
- Kirkstall Abbey Park

In addition we also worked on Leeds Central, the Elmet to Rothwell bid and St Matthews in Holbeck.

COMMUNITY

BERYL BURTON GARDENS

The garden was created to celebrate the achievements and life of Morley born cyclist Beryl Burton.

However, the garden, which is overlooked by an impressive mural of her, is dominated by cars and full of uneven paving and tired seating. It is not a space that is welcoming and makes you want to rest there, even though the trees offer shade on a hot day.

Three proposals were presented to the client looking at how this space might be transformed by removing all, some, or none of the existing disabled parking bays. To accompany this a document showing possible areas to relocate the bays was presented to Highways for consideration.

The proposals also extend to the area outside of the Groundwork Morley offices as the two spaces were implemented at the same time.







COMMUNITY

COBBLERS LANE, PONTEFRACT

The Environment Agency asked Groundwork to administer monies from an environmental fine, to carry out improvements within Pontefract. An overgrown area of land between houses used by residents as a cut through was chosen as it was dark and overgrown, uneven underfoot and anti-social behaviour was taking place there.

Working with Wakefield District Housing, the trees were crown lifted, understorey thinned, the full site cleared of litter and waste. We laid a new all-weather footpath, sowed species rich grass seed and created log piles to encourage wildlife and reduce the mowing regime on the site. This allowed children who used the route as a cut through to school to feel safe and seen when using the path.





BARLEY HILL

A great community project installed by Groundwork Pride team, creating something a little different than usual at Barley Hill in Garforth. The space provides a safe, colourful place for the community to enjoy and includes a story telling area, picnic tables, and soft landscaping.

COMMUNITY

BURLINGTON AVENUE POCKET PARK

Groundwork transformed Burlington Avenue in Bradford as part of the Better Start Bradford project.

The large area of land was previously open and vulnerable to anti-social behaviour. It is now protected with an artistic perimeter knee rail and has attractive playful features including portal stones, carvings and stepping stones, serving a purpose to the community. There is a boardwalk and wetland swale, along with new trees, shrub planting and wildflower areas.

MAGPIE LANE

Magpie Lane's green space had been used as a cut through by residents over a number of years, so a small project was created as part of the Morley Town Funds Programme to formalise the desire lines, create new seating areas and introduce new tree planting to soften the space.

GREEN SPACES

WHITEHALL RIVERSIDE POCKET PARK

Whitehall Riverside in Leeds was a narrow stretch of unused land between the River Aire and the Leeds and Liverpool Canal. This land is overlooked by existing and proposed development and had become a site full of weeds and used by rough sleepers. The adjacent towpath is also one of the busiest in the UK by and for jogging, pedestrians and cyclists.

In partnership with Leeds City Council, Canal and River Trust, Network Rail (and Groundwork Pride Ltd), we have reinvigorated the derelict land to provide an alternative path, providing a 'slower' route, seating and planting with views of the wildlife on the Aire and access to the visiting swans.

On Friday 31st March, the park was officially opened with a community event, inviting local counsellors and those who have helped to make the space a success.

GREEN SPACES

MORLEY GREENWAY

As part of the Green and Connected element of the Morley Town Investment Plan, Leeds City Council approached Groundwork Yorkshire to design and help deliver the upgrading of a greenway. The route will link Morley and Cottingley, incorporating a cycleway. A feasibility survey was put together and presented to the client and Subgroup. This will continue to be developed throughout 2023/24.



PARKLAND FIELDS

A drainage improvement scheme in Seacroft to tackle the water retention issue on a football field. A soak away was installed to carry excess water away from the site. A knee-high fence was installed along the north side of the park, and 15 small to medium sized trees were planted.



COMMON LANE, THORPE AUDLIN

Groundwork Yorkshire was approached by White Rose Forest to detail and deliver the planting of native trees and hedging on Common Lane in Thorpe Audlin. It was part of a Yorkshire programme for woodland creation, one of the most competitive and flexible funding packages for tree planting available to landowners. The projects across North and West Yorkshire benefitted from over £7.5 million of government funding for the planting of new trees and woodland.

GREEN SPACES

DYNAMIC DRAINS

Groundwork Hull's Dynamic Drains project has been running for three years in partnership with Hull City Council, Yorkshire Wildlife Trust and Environment Agency. The project aims to increase biodiversity along the man-made three and a half mile stretch of the Beverley and Barmston Drain. The team also work to improve the water quality, engage the local community in nature and collective action to address issues such as littering and fly tipping.



THORPE PARK ROAD

Thorpe Park Road Pocket Park in Hull was completed mid-March, consisting of a new footpath running adjacent to the Barmston Drain, a seating area, portal stone and native tree planting. The footpath is already well used and is accessible for all, enabling everyone to take this greener route, which was previously used as a short-cut across the grass. Bulb planting will take place in the autumn, supported by the Hull Green Team.

CLOUGH ROAD

The site runs adjacent to the Barmston and Beverley Drain and next to a shopping arcade at the junction of Clough Road and Scissons Way. There has been no former connection between the shopping arcade and Barmston Drain which was identified as a potential amenity area.

We installed six picnic tables and seats alongside the existing footpath along the drain to open up a community space. Barmston Drain has been accessed with a series of steps leading to a pond dipping platform.







AIR QUALITY

AIR QUALITY SCHOOLS

We began phase two of our air quality improvement scheme around five schools in Bradford. The schools are located close to busy roads, potentially causing harm from the fumes from car exhausts. Specific species of trees were selected that are proven to catch the finest particles to help reduce harm to human health.

We worked at:

- Byron Primary School
- > Fearnville Primary School
- Killinghall Primary School
- Lower Fields Primary Academy
- Westminster C of E Primary Academy

- **√** 150.5 lin m Hedera helix Ivy screen planting
- **⊘** 32 trees planted
