INTRODUCTION

THE STORY SO FAR

Bupa Foundation Green Community Grants is part of Bupa's Healthy Cities campaign and supports practical projects which help both people and the planet through grants of up to £2,500.

Applications went live during June 2023 and resulted in 1,063 applications from schools and community organisations across the UK.

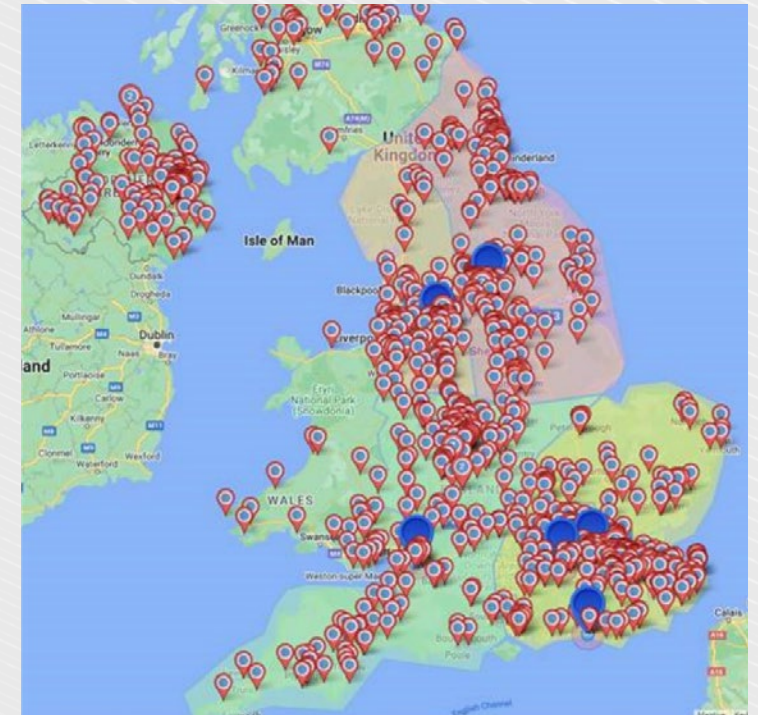
Groundwork UK partnered with the Bupa Foundation to award over £500,000 to green projects for 239 schools, not-for-profits and charities.

The successful applicants included:

- 163 schools who received funding for outdoor classrooms, forest schools, sensory gardens and similar projects
- 76 community groups, charities and food banks for community allotments, parks, playgrounds and green space improvements

To date, the projects have directly impacted more than 140,000 people across England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

ENGLAND

Alive Activities Ltd

Funding: £2,500

Alive Activities in Bristol are using funding to provide opportunities for people with dementia living in the community to connect with nature and get involved in gardening. The project has increased access to the outdoors for older people and those living with dementia by providing supported access to safe, dementia-friendly outdoor green spaces, enabling them to enjoy the benefits without the stress or responsibility of having to keep a garden maintained. By getting participants outdoors, the project aims to improve physical health and wellbeing of the participants, while increasing biodiversity and creating new habitats for wildlife and using sustainable practices and recycled materials to improve the local environment.

Alive Activities said: **"We anticipate supporting 60 older people living with dementia and their carers in the first six-months of session delivery. The allotment space when we were given it was very neglected, overgrown with weeds, and not securely fenced. The funding has enabled us to improve the space, install new fencing and a timber pagoda, together with benches, tables, chairs and gardening equipment to make the space safe and accessible for older people living with dementia."**

A community member said: **"The space is just amazing - so lovely. It will be fantastic to come here and do some gardening. I'm looking forward to getting out of the house, meeting people and making friends. Thank you so much."**

ENGLAND

Hillsborough Primary School

Funding: £2,385.55

Hillsborough Primary School in Sheffield used funding to create a sensory garden which pupils from all year groups have helped to create and maintain. The children planted shrubs, bulbs, various flowers and fruit trees. Pupils also had the opportunity to attend expert led gardening sessions, teaching them how to create and care for nature, and the sensory garden has facilitated natural art, the creation of bug hotels and mindfulness sessions for the pupils.

Hillsborough Primary School said: **“Together we’ve created a great place for the children and teaching staff to come to enjoy spending time outside in a more natural environment rather than our predominantly concrete playground. We feel this will be beneficial to their mental and physical health, and we will continue to use this space to support that for all pupils in future. The new sensory garden is also helping the planet’s health as we’ve created more green space and increased biodiversity and habitat where nature and wildlife can thrive. Following the success of this project, the children are now interested in a growing garden and harvesting their own fruits and vegetables. This has come from seeing the success of the garden project we have completed and them wanting to continue to learn how nature influences our daily lives.”**

NORTHERN IRELAND

Crossfire Trust

Funding: £2,500

Crossfire Trust in County Armagh is using funding to deliver gardening workshops to beneficiaries with complex mental health needs. The project helps people maintain sobriety and a home, improve health and wellbeing, access treatments and rehabilitation, and reduce reoffending. Through the gardening activities, training and volunteering that Crossfire Trust provide, participants are becoming part of their communities and improving their lives.

One project participant said: **"I came to Crossfire Trust in 2023 when I had been sofa surfing and in a hostel. It was amazing to have a bed to sleep in, people around me who were helpful and kind, and to be put in touch with other services who could help me. I really can't overstate how transformational it was. I helped in the garden project, learning about nature and how plants grow. I got my wellies on and warm clothing and we set about creating a garden from a disused plot of land that was overgrown. I helped co-design the project as I knew what the group's needs were and was involved in it from beginning to end. I am now eating healthier food and the cookery workshops were great, as most of us are on means tested benefits. I am now volunteering with Crossfire Trust charity in their food bank and care van. Thanks for the project and I intend to help others now as a result and improve lives."**

NORTHERN IRELAND

St Eugene's Primary School

Funding: £2,295

St Eugene's Primary School in Derry used funding for their Pollinator Trail project. The design of the trail was carried out by the children, who competed in a competition which involved research about pollinating plants and insects. When it came time to build the garden, the whole school took part alongside a local volunteer group with conservation expertise who also advised on the best native plant species and how to care for them. The planting activities were accessible to all pupils, including SEN individuals. The school invited various local experts and organisations to provide educational sessions about pollinators and their importance for biodiversity and the food chain, as well as topics around sustainable food, managing food waste, composting and promoting biodiversity and native plant species. To maintain the site, the school is involving various community groups including seniors from the local church group and the local secondary school.

St Eugene's Primary School said: **"We hope to see a flourishing population of pollinators in our school grounds. We have acquired learning tools to investigate, including clipboards, whiteboards and magnifying glasses. This will help the children understand the environmental impact of our Pollinator Trail and the importance of biodiversity. Bupa Foundation Green Community Grant has made a wonderfully positive difference to our school environment. From an urban space, devoid of green spaces, we have now developed an inclusive Pollinator Trail to support biodiversity, outdoor and environmental learning and sensory support. Our pupils love it and we can't wait to investigate, grow and learn in our lovely outdoor space."**

WALES

Pembrokeshire Young Onset Dementia

Funding: £2,011

Pembrokeshire Young Onset Dementia in Haverfordwest, Wales used funding to create a sensory garden for people living with young onset dementia. The overgrown courtyard has been cleared and is now an inviting safe outdoor space. A bright and colourful environment has been created by painting the drab old fence bright blue paint, colourful raised beds and colourful, fragrant plants. The old dirty concrete has been pressured washed and the stone walls have been cleaned.

Pembrokeshire Young Onset Dementia said: **“Those in the group who are affected by dementia have been actively involved in designing the garden, choosing the garden furniture, erecting the tables, clearing the site, filling the beds with compost, buying the plants, painting the fence, decorating pebbles for the water feature, planting and caring for the plants. Creating and maintaining the garden has and will provide opportunities for our group members to maintain skills, learn new skills and to enjoy socialising in the garden. The garden furniture enables the group to have lunch and refreshments outside and activities to be undertaken - arts and crafts, listening to music, reading and outdoor games. The project is a wonderful example of what can be achieved through co-production. People with dementia, their carers and family, volunteers and the charities trustees were all involved in the project working together as equals.”**

SCOTLAND

Frogston Primary School

Funding: £1,634.04

Frogston Primary School in Edinburgh used funding to purchase gardening equipment and a chicken coop. School staff, alongside pupils and their families are working together to create and maintain a functional green space which can be utilised by the school and members of the public. A variety of fruits and herbs, including strawberries, raspberries, mint and thyme amongst others, have been planted in the community garden to be accessible to the whole community, who can also attend sessions on how to identify, harvest and use them. A huge 42 metre moveable run extension was also purchased to house four hens, with pupils and their families taking it in turns to manage the care of the chickens following proper training provided by the school.

Frogston Primary School said: **"The thrill when they find eggs, the relationships they are building between themselves and the animals and anyone involved, the connections they are making between their lived experiences of animal husbandry and the reality for UK farming, the pride and commitment that they are showing every day, it's wonderful and has been truly transformative for many."**

A pupil said: **"I think the chickens have been a great part of our school! I like learning how to take care of them. It's like we have big responsibilities when we do it."**

Another pupil said: **"My brain feels calm when we work outside."**

OTHER PROJECTS

Queensway Primary School, Leeds Awarded £2,500

Queensway Primary School in Leeds used funding towards the development of a sensory allotment: **"This sensory allotment development will vastly benefit the whole school and community - we can now sculpt curriculum teaching around this. Within our school setting, we have 47% SEND need, 41% needing speech and language interventions and 30% vulnerable children - we cannot express how much this area will transform the wellbeing of children in our school."**

Cheadle Catholic Infant & Junior School, Stockport Awarded £2,500

Cheadle Catholic Infant and Junior School in Stockport used funding to develop a sustainable community allotment: **"The award is about providing a positive and sustainable impact on the community in which we live. Our children have been inspired and energised by the project and want to make an impact on our environment now and in the future."**

BARC (Bridgend adult resource centre) Bridgend community outreach centre CIC. Bridgend Awarded £2,250

Bridgend Community Outreach Centre in Bridgend used funding to deliver 'Bringing Nature Home' workshops to people without access to outdoor space: **"Three young children saw a hedgehog for the first time during one of our sessions. This first experience was important for their development, understanding and for connecting with wildlife and nature."**

Ray of Light Cancer Support, Abercynon Awarded £1,445.46

Ray of Light Cancer support in Abercynon, Wales, used funding to provide gardening and social horticultural therapy to people affected by cancer: **"Thanks to the generous support of the Bupa Foundation Green Grant, our gardening group has blossomed into a sanctuary of growth, healing, and community. Together, we cultivate more than just plants—we nurture hope, resilience, and connections that thrive alongside our blossoms. Your contribution has truly made a difference in the lives of those affected by cancer."**

OTHER PROJECTS

Magor Primary School PTFA, Magor Awarded £2,453.50

Magor Primary School PTFA in Magor, Wales used funding to 're-green' their premises: **"Throughout the summer term the children will have many lessons outdoors where they will be engaged in developing our outdoor areas and gardening. Our long-term aim is to grow produce using the equipment that you have allowed us to buy so that it can be shared throughout the school community and through the wider community via the community fridge. This funding has created a real buzz around school. The children are excited and enthusiastic about getting their hands dirty, helping things grow and having a nicer brighter environment around them. They are leading the project and are looking forward to watching the changes that come through the seasons. Thanks so much for helping us to get this off the ground. It will be a great asset for children coming through the school in years to come too!"**

Fisherton Primary School, Dunure Awarded £1867.58

Fisherton Primary School in Dunure, Scotland used funding to create a 'Nature Nook' on their grounds: **"Our project has been very exciting so far and we can't wait to watch it grow further and bring great joy to our beneficiaries. We have had fabulous engagement from all staff and pupils in helping building this area, and two weekend sessions for parents and members of the community to come and volunteer to help us move the project forward. We have been really lucky to get stone donated from our 100 year-old local high school. The beautiful old stone will be used decoratively around the pond and garden. This will add some features to keep our history and heritage alive as well as a great talking point for our intergenerational activities. This grant gave us the funds to get this project started. This was a fabulous way to kick start our Nature Nook and we can't wait to watch it grow and evolve for many, many years!"**
