Our team have expertise in Therapeutic Forest School, History, Animal Care and Science. We are also an approved Alternative Provision provider for North and South Tyneside supporting Key Stages 1-4. Our hands-on, educational experiences enable children to learn about, develop an interest in, and truly understand topics. We have been delivering high quality, engaging and informative education programmes with excellent outcomes, for over 25 years at West Boldon Lodge.

Jarrow Hall Anglo-Saxon Farm, Village and Bede Museum

Jarrow Hall offers immersive learning experiences that focus on Anglo-Saxon and Viking History, Daily Life, Farming and Saint Bede. Our knowledge and passion for farming, history and culture bring learning to life: Whether Key Stage 1 are learning about 'Changes through Time', and Key Stage 2 are practicing their Anglo-Saxon battle techniques or your group is taking part in Farm School, our immersive teaching and learning approach enable children to gain knowledge, connect with nature, culture and heritage, and truly understand topics.

Jarrow Hall's education programme was awarded 'The Sandford Award', an independent, quality assured assessment of formal, curriculum-aligned and site led heritage learning programmes. Recognition was also given to our informal family learning programmes and self-guided provision. The award scheme is managed by the Heritage Education Trust in partnership with Bishop Grosseteste University.



OVERVIEW

Our programme of outdoor learning sessions provides an overview of the type and range of activities we can offer across our sites. We tailor all of our sessions to meet the needs of each group of visitors and develop bespoke sessions to aid in classroom learning.

Curriculum Linked Programmes

We offer a range of programmes that align with the National Curriculum and topics commonly covered by schools. We focus on using our learning centres and staff expertise to provide pupils with knowledge and hands-on experience that can be built on in school, or used to reinforce classroom based learning.

Enrichment Programmes

Our education team firmly believe in a holistic approach to education and that challenging and immersive experiences in our youth stay with us and inspire us throughout our lives. We offer a range of unforgettable encounters that develop resilience, self-confidence and social skills to compliment the formal curriculum structure. Our staff and environment is tailored to support the freedom needed for SEND children, including enclosed outdoor space and staff trained in the holistic approach to leaning. All our enrichment activities are tailored to the needs of your group and our staff will discuss programme content with you at the time of booking.

Outreach Programmes

We understand that not every school has the opportunity to visit us at Jarrow Hall and West Boldon Lodge so we offer some of our workshops and sessions as part of an outreach programme. Teacher Training and School Support

Our education team have extensive experience that your school can draw upon to make practical improvements to your Forest School site. You can gain knowledge and skills and even access funding to make outdoor education accessible to your school community. Route2Work College

In addition, our Ofsted rated 'Good', Route2Work College provides a specialised learning Study Programme for LLDD (Learners with Learning Difficulties and Disabilities) aged 16 – 25 years old. Learners gain qualifications in either Animal Care, Land Based Studies, Customer Service or Health and Social Care as well as English and Maths, all of which are delivered by our highly experienced and knowledgeable team. 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The centre is an Erlund-house log cabin and is an inspiring and flexible learning environment. The Lodge's eco credentials including solar hot water and natural insulation demonstrate Groundwork and National Grid's commitment to sustainability. The 13 hectare site is comprised of diverse habitats which offer safe and secure surroundings for all age groups to learn about the environment and encourage a positive and caring relationship with the natural world. The centre and site are accessible to all visitors.

Forest Play-School

This is a public session and is for pre-school children accompanied by an adult.

Group size is limited to 15 children per session. Subsidised places are available.

Join us for our popular Forest Play-School programme where you and your toddler can explore our purpose built Forest Play-School area and enjoy outdoor activities including natural art and crafts and bug hunts. Activities are specifically designed for pre-school children and their grown-up to enjoy engaging with the natural environment together. We embed all 7 areas of learning and development from the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum into our planning and delivery so that children can holistically learn and develop their skills.

We welcome groups of up to 15 pupils and can accommodate up to 2 groups per school visit.

A half-day school visit is £185 and a full-day visit is £295 per group.

Forest School is designed to encourage and inspire children through positive experiences and participation in motivating and achievable tasks. Focussing on personal, social and emotional development as well as traditional knowledge gained, pupils undertake a range of outdoor activities including; den building, camp-fire cooking, natural art, storytelling, sensory exploration, orienteering, music making, bushcraft and nature hunts. Children are supported to develop a connection and respect for the natural world and encouraged to improve communication, team work and problem solving skills.

A half-day school visit is £185 and a full-day visit is £295 per group.

Beach School applys Forest School philosophy to our fantastic north east coastline. We encourage and inspire children through positive experiences and participation in motivating and achievable tasks. Focussing on personal, social and emotional development aswell as traditional knowledge gained, pupils undertake a range of activities including, sensory exploration of the beach, looking at the flora and fauna of the coastline and investigations of smaller habitats such as rockpools. We discuss the effects of pollution on our coastline and demonstrate through hands-on practical tasks to actively improve our coastline.

Pupils partake in farm tasks (within their ability), and build their interactions and engagement with different animals. Pupils will contribute to discussions on how to be safe around the farm. Themes of activities may be adapted to meet the interests of the group and typically cover: farm tour, animal identification, feeding the animals, spending time around animals, sensory activities depending on the season such as planting or foraging, introduction to the seasons and story time.

Identify a number of different trees in our woodland, identify the conditions a seed needs to enable it to grow and plant seeds to take home, investigate the different parts of a plant and their purposes (KS1+2), discuss human uses of a range of plants.

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Life Cycles



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Dinosaurs







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Forest School | *Recommended course length 4-6 weeks

We welcome groups of up to 30 pupils and can accommodate up to 2 groups per school visit.

A half-day school visit is £185 and a full-day visit is £295 per group.

The philosophy of Forest School is to encourage and inspire individuals of all ages through positive experiences and participation in engaging, motivating and achievable tasks. The focus is as much on personal, social and emotional development as on traditional knowledge gained. Forest School is a long-term approach to teaching and learning and we recommend a minimum of 4 sessions which can be consecutive weeks or split over the course of a year. Participants undertake a range of outdoor activities that include; den building, campfire cooking, natural art, storytelling, sensory exploration, orienteering, music making, bushcraft skills, nature hunts, muddy play, and more. Our team support participants to develop a connection and respect for the natural world and overcome barriers to learning by encouraging communication, team work and problem solving.



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
Changes Through Time on The Farm

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

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
Workshop 1 | Anglo-Saxon Monastic Life

Anglo-Saxon Monastic Life allows groups to walk in the footsteps of St Bede, by visiting St Paul's Church – which used to be part of the monastic complex of St Paul's Monastery. Pupils will be able to dress up in a monk's habit and then perform an Anglo-Saxon Benedictine liturgy. Whilst in St Paul's Church your guide will allow children to explore the church, and tell stories of the miracles performed by the Anglo-Saxon saints. Pupils will also have the opportunity to visit the ruins of the later medieval monastery (weather permitting). *An additional charge of 50p per child is requested which goes directly to support St Paul's Church.

Workshop 2 | Bede: Monk, Historian, Scientist and Saint

This workshop explores one of the most important and famous Anglo-Saxons to have ever lived – Bede. Pupils will learn about his life in St Paul's Monastery, his importance in our knowledge of the Anglo-Saxons, history and science. Children can take a closer look at some replicas of the items that Bede used to create his books, before your guide will perform a live science experiment to demonstrate the way in which monks used to create ink. 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
Workshop 5 | Anglo-Saxon Clothing and Textiles
